My Friends in Christ,

It has certainly been an interesting April, at least weather wise. Snow and weather showed up in April as if Mother Nature is not quite willing to let spring come. Yet, spring came, and with it, new birth, new growth, new opportunities, new winds to blow around the warmer air.

May is a time of transition into new things as the northern hemisphere awakes into rebirth and renewal. The sun shines longer and brighter. The warmer wind brings hope for a future of welcoming and beautiful weather. I think that is why I always get excited for Pentecost, which this year happens to fall in May. Pentecost brings hope of something new happening, not just on that day in Jerusalem over 2000 years ago, but here today, if we just open ourselves up to the possibilities.

Acts 2:1-21 tells us that a rush of wind came from heaven, blowing through the house the

disciples were in. Tongues of fire appeared to rest on each of them, filling those in the house with the Holy Spirit and giving them the ability to speak in languages other than their own. It must have felt like creation all over again, with wind and fire, with something new bursting forth. There was the amazing ability to speak in other languages and be understood by people of many different cultures and lands. In that moment, all the people were one in their hearing, even if they could not understand the deeper meaning of what they saw and heard.

Fire...wind...Galileans, speaking in many tongues, dramatic signs that God was doing a new thing that would transform the lives of all those present, as well as those beyond that moment and place. Pentecost is a time of new beginnings, a time, like spring, of new birth and new starts. A time of transformation into something beyond what was, into something that could be, if minds and hearts are open to recognize that Pentecost is not just something that happened that one day, so long ago, but can happen every day.

How can Pentecost become a daily reminder for us that our lives are transformed through the Triune God, and how do we recognize the Holy Spirit at work in us, in others, and in the world? That is such a big question, which can seem challenging, and even seem impossible to know. And yet, we have a creation that is transforming right now,

- as we watch the grass green, and the flowers and trees bloom,
- as we feel a warmer wind blows across our skin that is not covered by heavy clothes,
- as we smell the scents of rebirth, regeneration, and renewal in our area of the world,
- as we hear birds, farm equipment, and those things that tell us something new is happening,
- and as we move from winter sleep into spring emerging, our world transforming again.

Pentecost allows us to see the world with new eyes, to appreciate what transformation looks like and feels like. Spring into summer allows us to experience transformation in a beautiful way, showing us that transformation takes time, it takes patience, it is not always perfect, and it takes work. Spring, just like Pentecost, can help us better understand who God has transformed us to be, in and through Jesus and the Holy Spirit. We are called to be open to new things, open to helping others, growing in our lives of faith, family, and friends. The Holy Spirit guides us in all we are and in all that we do, being present with us in our impatience, in our imperfection, and in helping us in the work we do as God's people on this beautiful planet called Earth. We just have to be willing to open our eyes, our ears, our minds, and our hearts, to the Pentecost God is offering to us every day.

I pray that, as you go through spring into summer, you take time to see, and hear, and feel, and experience, the transformation going on in and around you, and that you take that moment to give thanks to God, in and through Jesus and the Holy Spirit, for this amazing and beautiful gift.

Call to order – By Ruthann at 6:30

Devotions – Ruthann presented devotions. Next Month – Eugenie will present next month.

Visitors: Jim Cutting – Buildings & Grounds Committee

Approval of minutes – A motion was made by John and seconded by Eugenie to approve the minutes from the March meeting. Motion carried.

Approval of Agenda –A motion was made by Tom and seconded by Barb to approve the agenda. Motion carried.

Other Business-

Treasurer's Report –Discussion and questions regarding a few accounts on the treasurer's report, which Jana was able to answer and clarify. A motion

was made by Tom, seconded by Jacki to approve the Treasurer's report. Motion carried.

Finance Report – Finance did not meet as there was not a quorum.

Building & Grounds – Jim Cutting's Report-

Maxwell Plumbing moved water pipe in boiler room. Outside water facet was eliminated. Aubrey Electric will re-quote the electrical work in the boiler room and the kitchen.

Estimates will be needed for a few separate issues. Jim presented a desire by a member to have an automatic handicap door installed in the Narthex. Jim has begun investigating what is needed to complete this project.

SureFire will return to work on the Narthex blower motor. The issue is working to be resolved.

Executive Committee Did not meet.

Parish Education: Eugenie reported that Adult Ed is going very well with discussion continuing to center around the ELCA social statements of today. A Sunday School coordinator potential candidate will be contacted by Pastor Traci.

Worship Committee: The committee met this evening. Worship services during the Lent season were discussed. Services were well attended. Members volunteered to assist in the various roles to make the worship services successful. Supply pastors

are being planned for Pastor Traci's upcoming absences during worship services; 5/11-12, 7/20-21, 8/10-11, 8/17-18 10/26-27. Pastor Rich Collier is set for all Saturday services. Pastor Ken will be available for 7/21 & 10/27. A pastor will be needed for 5/12, 8/11, and 8/18. Discussion and suggestions made to potentially record the sermon and display it on the screen. May 19th is confirmation Sunday and High School graduation. We have three confirmands and do not believe the HS graduation will conflict with confirmands.

IT Committee: Did not meet. Brenda noted that Casey visited and went over several issues with her. Computer space was looked at and determined the laptop has plenty of space. Email has been cleaned up and put into yearly folders. Those folders prior to 2020 will be put in an archive folder. Files and folders dated prior to 2020 will also be archived and saved on a thumb drive. Casey suggested the computer, Wi-Fi and digital equipment be on a surge protected electrical strip. Brenda has taken care of this task. Jim Cutting suggested we should also have a battery back-up. The computer for the Ring camera system has discontinued working. The computer has been disconnected and placed in the records room for disposal. The Ring camera system has been installed on Brenda's computer. The antiquated phone and answering machine were discussed. Jana has been contacted to ask if she has a contact at Spectrum to look at updating the phone system and answering machine.

Fun-Raising Committee: Swiss Steak dinner on Sunday. Ticket sales are going well. A record crowd is expected. Thrivent has donated \$250.00 toward the event. Pizza sales discussed as a possible event for July. Many of the resources for pizza making and sales are still on hand from past sales.

Lenten Services went well. New devotional study was used and received well.

Steve and Karen Erickson met with Pastor Traci and requested membership. Steve and Karen would like to participate with Worship Ministries.

New Member bible class will be started. Instruction book, April 24th for 4 weeks "Baptized, We Live"

Anyone from the congregation is invited.

Pastor Traci has been asked to be Dean in Beaver Dam conference of the South-Central Synod of Wisconsin. Pastor Traci agreed to take the position with the understanding that St. Paul is her priority. She will be able to attend the scheduled meetings via Zoom.

Synod Assembly News

The 2023 South Central ELCA Synod Assembly was held at Evangelical Lutheran Church in Mount Horeb on Saturday, May 20,2023. During our busy day of worshiping and listening to speakers, we had a chance to listen to and later vote on three new resolutions.

This month we are discussing Resolution 2: "Reconciling in Christ Commitments" which expresses a call to ensure the welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for all people, most particularly those who have historically suffered exclusion or condemnation from the church.

The South-Central Synod of Wisconsin became a "Reconciling in Christ" synod in 2017, with the adopted Welcome Statement: "Following Jesus, who commanded his followers: 'Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another, and believe that all persons are created in the image of God'. The South-Central Snood of Wisconsin strives to be fully inclusive of all. This synod welcomes people of every race, background, age, political affiliation, economic and social status, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, and mental and physical ability and strives to enable all people to participate fully in the life and work of the church and its expressions".

Reconciling Works called for the following updated commitments from congregations Reconciling in Christ congregation, synods, and other partners by 2025:

-to name a commitment to racial equity or antiracism in Welcome Statements

-to be open to calling Black, Brown, Indigenous, Person of Color as rostered leaders

-to facilitate LGBTQIA+ weddings and blessings

-to make a meaningful annual contribution to support the national RIC program.

The synod has and will use 2024 to update our commitments through workshops, conversation, and communications as well as congregations updating their own commitments.






